

March news from the Library

Thursday, 6th March is World Book Day and schools across the UK have been engaged in activities to promote reading for pleasure. Mr. Wilks and Miss Martin lead assemblies with our students and the library is hosting a display of mystery readers – staff members shared their favourite books from their youth and students are invited to guess which staff member selected each title. Students will be given a voucher to claim a free book from participating book sellers – our own local <u>Pickering Book Tree</u> has a great display and staff there are eager to share the joy of reading.

The <u>National Literacy Trust</u> sponsors this event because "We champion the fun of reading, because it seriously improves lives. Reading for fun is the single biggest indicator that a child will grow up to enjoy a happier and more successful life – more than their family circumstances, their parents' educational backgrounds or their income."

Here at Lady Lumley's, we share their mission, not just in the library and the English department, but across all areas of the school. Based on recent research there is evidence to show that listening to books can offer similar benefits and our students have access to a wide range of titles on the <u>ePlatform</u> and can also access audiobooks via the public library system on the Borrowbox platform. "At a time when reading for enjoyment levels are at an all-time low, findings suggest that listening to audio formats, including audiobooks and podcasts, has the potential to support learning, wellbeing and reading engagement in many children and young people." (National Literacy Trust <u>audio books</u>)

The library is in use for Year 11 and Year 13 practice exams for the next couple of weeks so I'm taking the library to the classroom! Year 7 students are sharing posters they made about their Book Buzz choices and Year 8 students are sharing presentations about an author they have researched. Then they will be embarking on an exploration of genre to identify features in books that determine where they belong in our library. The Year 9 students continue their examination of our non-fiction collection and will make use of the ePlatform to read or listen to information books online

Author Visit and Creative Writing Workshop

On 31st January we held a creative writing workshop for about 13 students from Year 7 to Year 12. We were lucky to have with us Winston Plowes, a poet and land artist, who worked with the students on Friday afternoon about developing creative writing about the senses and about memories inside and outside of the home.

Winston was a pupil at Lady Lumley's in the 1980's and as well as working with our students also enjoyed a tour of the school and his old haunts. This included a visit to the maths mobile where he said he had performed his first poem about his teacher's nose - so brought back lots of memories!

The students really enjoyed having the space and time to discuss memories and ideas, and particularly appreciated the part where they were given a lump of ice each as stimulus to talk and write about the senses.

Miss Rueth and myself will be running a creative writing workshop on Wednesdays after school - 3-4p.m in the library next half term, where we will use some of the resources and ideas Winston has left with us. The ice will be long gone by then but the memories won't.

The creative writing workshop is open to students who took part in the session with our author, but also if any other student would like to attend, please speak to Miss Wilson.

An Invisible Man visits again...

This Tuesday, Y10 were lucky enough to work with Stephen and Maria from An Invisible Man theatre company as part of the performance of Inside Out and its accompanying workshop. Students saw a play which looked at many layered themes, with the most obvious ones being coercive and manipulative behaviour in a relationship, talking about mental health and healthy outlets, and teenage pregnancy and its wider consequences. It was commented on how well our students engaged and interacted with the performance and workshop (as always). This supports conversations students have been having in their Life lessons at the moment (around mental health, well-being and managing grief/loss) and which they will have later in the year (around consent and relationships).



Services for disabled children and young people in Ryedale

1 to 1 Flexible Care Service

A support worker supports a child/young person/young adult on a 1-to-1 basis, in the home or in the community. This is a paid for service. Includes (not an exhaustive list);

- · Extra support for parents in the home
- · Supporting a child in the community e.g. swimming/cubs/brownies
- · Supporting a young adult at a daytime activity

Junior Club

A leisure group for 8 to 12 year olds, they participate in a variety of activities including swimming, sports, crafts, play parks. Sessions run monthly on a Saturday.

Youth Group

Youth group for 13 to 18 year olds, based at Kirkbymisperton Village Hall. Term-time on Thursday evening 6.00 to 8.00pm.

RSFQ&A

An LGBTQ+ group for disabled young people, meeting monthly for social events and exploring ways to promote equality and diversity.

Over 18's

Fortnightly sessions on Friday evenings for 18 to 25 year olds, mixing leisure activities with social and independence skills.

Education

RSF, as an Alternative Provider, can support children and young people with education & life skills when they are unable to attend mainstream or special schools.

School Holiday sessions

5 hour activity sessions in the summer school holidays, groups are for 5 to 12 year olds and 13 to 18 year olds and Over 18s. Activities are based in the community covering trips out, sports, music, crafts etc.

Transport

RSF can sometimes arrange transport to and from all the above services where families may have difficulty accessing a service.

Services for families of disabled young people in Ryedale

Family Activities

A wide range of activities open to all families (including siblings, grandparents etc.) Activities include day trips to attractions (e.g. Peat Rigg, Yorkshire Wildlife Park, Ice skating), indoor and outdoor activities. Costs vary, some are free, others subsidised. RSF aim to provide transport for these activities. Please see the RSF newsletter and website for current information.

Family day passes to local attractions, Flamingoland, Dalby Forest, Castle Howard and North York Moors Railway. Available weekdays, contact the RSF office for details of booking. Max cards available for £5 please see website.

Family Support Group

Regular daytime meetings for any parent to attend for general support, advice, empathy. This session takes place, generally, on a Tuesday at various cafes around Ryedale, please contact RSF for the dates and times. The group also arrange evening social meals and have a closed Facebook group.

RAFT - Ryedale Autism & ADHD Families Together

Daytime meetings for parent/carers of autistic children and those with ADHD Lots of experience, support and empathy for new parents. Monthly meetings in Malton, lunch meetings and a closed Facebook group.

Support for families of children under 5 - 'Little Steps'

A monthly meeting to support the families of younger ones, a great way of connecting with other families for support and hearing about RSF services.

Cost of Living Crisis

RSF can support families by referring to relevant agencies, providing foodbank vouchers and help with grant applications.

Newsletter, Website & Social Media

Families can receive our quarterly newsletter with up-to-date information about our activities and other items of news which may be of interest to families. Information is also available on our website and social media sites.

Advocacy

RSF can support parents with a range of issues including education, housing issues and will signpost on to an appropriate agency for help with benefits.

Families are welcome to visit our base in Old Malton by appointment or our staff can visit families at home to discuss support.
