### **Attendance**

### New Attendance Policy

The Local Governing Committee approved our new Attendance Policy last week. This is available on our website <u>here</u> and was shared with families last week. Please support your child to ensure attendance remains above 97%, in line with the new policy, if you feel you or your child need further support with attendance, please contact the school on 01751 472846.

### Hay fever

We have an increase in students off school due to hay fever. While we understand that hay fever can be uncomfortable for some, it is generally not considered an acceptable reason for absence from school. Missing valuable learning time can impact your child's progress. We strongly encourage taking preventative measures to manage hay fever, taking an antihistamine tablet before school. Students are also able to carry up to two paracetamol on their person should they require to take them during the school day. If your child experiences severe hay fever symptoms that you are concerned about, we recommend consulting with your GP for further advice.

### **Punctuality**

A number of students are regularly arriving significantly late to school on a morning. Please be aware, that if your child arrives at school after registration is closed without an acceptable reason, the school legally has to mark them as "Late after registration" which is a U code and counts as an absence for the morning on their attendance record.

If your child is going to be late due to an appointment, please contact the school office to let them know, to ensure that they are marked appropriately, rather than unauthorised late.

### Personal Development Updates

Lots of exciting lessons are being learned across the Personal Development curriculum this term. We obviously encourage you to continue the conversations we begin in lessons at home, so to that end, here's what students are in the midst of studying!

Year 7 - In Life, students have begun, or are about to begin, learning about the emotional side of puberty and how to manage the changes puberty brings. In their Leadership Award lessons, students are bringing together their wider knowledge to discuss how we maximise our brain power to really be our best.

Year 8 - Year 8 have been learning about the challenges LGBT+ people face as they grow up in the UK today and how we can all be better allies to people who are different to ourselves, not just to LGBT+ people. They will then go on to understand the importance of healthy relationships and consent.

<u>Year 9</u> - In Life lessons, students are also learning about healthy, consensual relationships and what to do if a relationship is harmful. In Futures, Year 9 have had chance to research further the providers who were at the Careers Fair the other week, and will shortly begin their project working with members of Pickering Town CIC to create an event that could put Pickering on the map. Members of Pickering CIC will be there to guide students and help them work out the feasibility of their ideas.

<u>Year 10</u> - Year 10 also had the chance to do further research about their Post-16 choices and are about to recap why consent is important, as well as the impact watching pornography can have on intimate relationships.




### News from the Library

May is exam season, and the library is playing host to some of our students who are sitting their GCSEs and A levels. Unfortunately, this means that students are not able to access the space during break and lunch times when exams are happening. It also means that I am the mobile librarian carrying boxes of books to classrooms and making use of our IT suites.

Earth Day at the end of April prompted an investigation of climate change. Year 7 and 8 students looked at books from our non-fiction collection and then spent time in IT visiting a curated set of websites to find information on the subject that "...is the most pressing issue facing humanity today." (United Nations).

Year 9 students have been engaged in group reading with focused, timed reading sessions followed by group discussions and feedback to the class. We will be continuing with those books in future lessons to give readers a chance to really dive



into the story they are reading and make connections with the characters and settings. We will also be making use of ePlatform for some free choice reading, using ebooks and audiobooks – choosing what they read is an important tool to increase engagement with literature -"..research has demonstrated that three times as many children and young people who are most engaged with literacy have better mental wellbeing than those who are least engaged." (National Literacy Trust)

This Friday, 16th May, visual artist, Simon Crook, is coming to do some work on manga and designing / writing about characters. He will be working with a selected group of students from across year groups from 1-3 p.m. – we are very excited to offer this opportunity to our Manga fans! I can't wait to see what they create!

### Author visit


We are delighted to announce that author Phil Earle will be visiting our school on Monday 23rd June. He will be talking to our Year 7 students and the Year 6 students from Pickering Junior school about his latest book, 'The Dawn of Adonis'.

"It is 1911 and London's docks thrum with underhand deals, none so great as the arrival of a valuable, rare and exotic animal, smuggled from the depths of the Congolese rainforest. The baby gorilla stands to make one man, the shady Goliath Deeds, very, very rich. Heaven help anyone who dares stand in his way, not least the brave and innocent twelve-year-old Nettie Beecroft, who finds herself embroiled in a dangerous rescue attempt where she encounters toshers, bone grubbers and gangsters."

We are partnering with Pickering Book Tree for this exciting event, and they have arranged for families to pre-order a copy of the book, which will be available on the day for students to have Phil Earle sign for them. Families will have the opportunity to buy the books for £7.20 through our My Child at School portal so look out for the item to appear in the payments section - the deadline for ordering is Monday, 2nd June. There is no obligation to buy a book in order to attend the author visit, but the sale of books contributes to the event being free of charge to our school. In addition to the book, Pickering Book Tree will be giving out a loyalty card which automatically gives students 10% off every future book they buy at the Book Tree.






# Toxic Masculinity Workshop

# Who Are Young Carers?

Young carers are students who provide care for a family member due to illness, disability, mental health challenges, or addiction. They take on responsibilities that may impact their education and wellbeing.

# Signs to Look For

- Tiredness or lack of concentration
- Frequent lateness or absences
- Appearing stressed, withdrawn, or anxious
- Difficulty keeping up with schoolwork



## How to support young carers

- Build trust to make them feel safe when sharing their situation.
- Adjust homework deadlines or attendance policies when needed.
- Refer them to school counsellors or external support services.
